REPORTS

1. Purpose of advisory Jim Straw
 - a. Discussion of breaking this Advisory group into subject areas (food, finances, family, textiles), and the consensus was NO because businesses work together, and we all learn from each other.
 - i. Contact list and acronym helper handed out.
 - b. Quandary of how to get more business/industry involved. Schools are preparing their workforce and need to know what is important to them; this is a great place for business to give input.
 - i. Ask students for their employer contact information.
 - ii. Thank you Elaine from MAX at Mirabeau for attending for the first time!
2. FCCLA:
 - a. Rhonda - My group is planning to work on the homeless "clothes packs" that we talked about last spring. That is we will find out the sizes of students (at our feeder schools) in need of clean clothes and make one clothes changes for them into packets so they can come right in to school, shower and have a set of clothes ready to go for them. We are planning our fundraiser to designate funds for this projects as well as contacting Josh Bergman and Susan Stickney for their assistance with this project. We are also going to help with "Food for Thought" to help provide food for the weekend for our students in this district. We have a great turnout this fall and those are just our immediate plans besides checking into competitions.

- b. Carolyn: 19 students attended the Leadership conference, students are working on getting food worker cards in order to help at event concessions; we had candy gram “oops” in that federal nutrition guidelines do not allow us to sell suckers, so we have to find an alternative treat to put in the cards (after already being approved to purchase 300!); we are working on an FCCLA tour of SCC and have multiple groups working on projects such as cookies for birthdays, the STCU \$100 project, and a movie night.
 - c. List of various competition opportunities handed out so business/industry could see which apply to them for mentor opportunities.
3. Resumes:
- a. The GU packet that Lois uses is still good information, and Susan likes how the rubric is specific. Single Survival interviews are tomorrow, and Susan will be grading resumes. Elaine brought a “good” and “bad” sample as well as a resume guide site that is well-done.

PRESENTATIONS/OTHER

1. Josh presented Lifesmarts.org and went through several of the site features on the screen:
 - Register as a coach then add teams, as many teams as you want.
 - 4 players and 1 alternate per team: nationals = 1 FCCLA and 1 FBLA can go vs. state competition where 1 out all the high schools registered go, and there are fewer schools than clubs, so you have a better chance of going if you register as a school, NOT an FCCLA.
 - Nationals are in Seattle this year.
 - Free to sign up
 - WSECU gives \$2000 to state finalist; Jumpstart gives \$1000 to state finalist. Attractions in the host city are paid for, and there is very little fundraising needed, if any.
 - Students are paired with a “sister state” and do social activities.
 - Homepage: lifesmarketsU has banking, consumer etc. information for students to study.
 - Daily quiz = don't have to be logged in to do
 - How to implement in daily routine: daily quiz as a warm up activity (5 questions), meet 1x before state and 1 before nationals at minimum
 - **Category** quizzes: do prequiz and do all of them to qualify as individuals (player/category/prequiz) = before Feb. Study a bit first because you can't take the quiz again.
 - Coach: select a team captain to go in and do Team Smarts and ability to win \$100 monthly
 - Teacher recordkeeping? Very little; log on to find your team stats.
 - State in Feb. (Yakima?) Nationals are April 17-20 Seattle. Students are kept BUSY.
 - Safety smarts: high school students go teach elementary kids.
 - Can rearrange teams as needed to cover for those who can't go due to health, grades, etc.
 - Scholarship opportunities
 - Josh has a buzzer system and will mentor your team.
 - Booklet = good, but no coach's code needed, so ignore that part.
